



% Very or Somewhat Important Total (n=1125)



- American workers appear to be most concerned that the next President focus on increasing the proportion of American workers that earn a living wage, making it harder to outsource American jobs to foreign countries and providing healthcare coverage for all citizens.
- Increased workplace safety regulation, expanded family leave laws and stronger workplace discrimination law enforcement form a second tier of key issues, with about seven out of ten American workers saying it is important that the next President focus on them.




% Very or Somewhat Important - By Race -



With the exception of increasing the proportion of American workers earning a living wage and making it harder to outsource American jobs to foreign companies, non-white American workers place significantly greater importance on all workplace issues evaluated than do their white counterparts.



% Very or Somewhat Important - By Region -



- American workers from the Northeast place significantly greater importance on:
 - Providing health coverage for all US citizens compared to Westerners,
 - Increased workplace safety regulation and strengthening workplace discrimination law enforcement compared to Midwesterners and Southerners, and
 - Expanding family leave laws and allowing employees to sue for workplace bullying compared to Midwesterners.
- Southerners place significantly less importance than those from other regions on making it easier for workers to unionize and less importance on allowing employees to sue for workplace bullying than do their Western counterparts.
- Compared to Midwestern workers, those living in the West place significantly more importance on strengthening workplace discrimination law enforcement of and allowing employees to sue for workplace bullying.






- Compared to Independents, Democrats are significantly more likely and Republicans are significantly less likely to identify;
 - Increasing the proportion of American Workers earning a living wage,
 - Providing healthcare for all US citizens,
 - Expanding family leave laws, and
 - Strengthening workplace discrimination law enforcement as priorities for the next President.
- Democrats place significantly greater importance than do Republicans and Independents on;
 - Making it harder to outsource US jobs to foreign countries,
 - Increasing workplace safety regulation,
 - Making it easier for unions to organize workers, and
 - Allowing employees to sue and collect damages for workplace bullying.




% Very or Somewhat Important - By Political Affiliation –


% Very or Somewhat Important Total (n=1125)



- Immigration issues appear to be much less important, overall, than workplace regulation issues.
- ♦ Fewer than half of American workers identify any of the immigration issues presented as critical issues for the next President.



% Very or Somewhat Important - By Race -




- Compared to their white counterparts, non-white American workers are significantly more likely to identify
 - Changing immigration laws to make it easier for foreign scientists and engineers to work in the US,
 - Increasing the number of legal immigrants allowed into the US, and
 - Granting amnesty to immigrants who are now not legally entitled to work here

% Very or Somewhat Important - By Region -




- Compared to American workers from other regions of the country, Midwestern workers place significantly less importance on changing immigration laws to make it easier for foreign scientists/engineers to work in the US and granting amnesty to immigrants not now legally entitled to work here.
- American workers residing in the West are significantly more likely than their counterparts living in other regions to identify increasing the number of legal immigrants allowed into the US as a priority for the next President.
- Southerners are significantly more likely than those from the Midwest to say it is important for the next President to focus on increasing the number of legal immigrants allowed into the US.


% Very or Somewhat Important - By Education -



- Compared to American workers with less education, those who have completed at least some post-graduate work are significantly more likely to say it is important for the next President to focus on:
 - Changing immigration laws to make it easier for foreign scientists and engineers to work in the US,
 - Increasing the number of legal immigrants allowed into the US, and
 - Granting amnesty to immigrants not now legally entitled to work here.



% Very or Somewhat Important - By Political Affiliation -



- Republicans are significantly less likely than Democrats and Independents to identify changing immigration laws to make it easier for foreign scientists and engineers to work in the US and increasing the number of legal immigrants allowed into the US as priorities for the next President.
- Democrats are significantly more likely than Republicans and Independents to say that the next President should focus on granting amnesty to all immigrants not now legally entitled to work here.
